Celebrating Women Every Day

At PeacePlayers Middle East, an organization led by women and devoted to the growth of Palestinian and Israeli girls as athletes and as leaders – we celebrate women every day. And yet, last month, International Women's day gave us a special opportunity to really think about what that means. That's why over several weeks leading up to and following International Women's Day, PeacePlayers Middle East held many activities and events that highlighted women's empowerment and advocated for the importance of "women supporting women."

In one particular event, an overnight retreat held at the end of February near Jerusalem, 30 young leaders, alumnae, and staff were brought together for two days of leadership and team building sessions focused particularly on celebrating young women's leadership, in fostering gender equality, and in looking deeply into the importance of gender equity in sports and other areas of society.
