in our mission to achieve our core values and bridge racial and socio-economic divides, creating a more peaceful South Africa.

In January 2022 our brand new Executive Director (ED), Dr Alison Misselhorn, joined our family and brings a mass of experience, new skills and leadership knowledge to our organisation. She has a multitude of qualifications and we are very grateful to have someone of her calibre join our family. A huge welcome is extended to her and she has already proven her worth over and over in the past year.

Our outgoing ED, Nasiphi “Nas” Khafu moved to the position of Director of Strategy and Partnerships so she can spend more time doing what she loves; working with all of you and living out the values of PeacePlayers.

I am thrilled to report that our core programme children and youth, mostly from black and disadvantaged backgrounds, are more and more playing against more affluent and diverse schools, which creates the opportunity for these kids from vastly different cultures, races and socio-economic backgrounds to connect, play together, become friends and learn about one another. After all, children who play together can learn to live together.

A huge highlight for me was the Friendship Games, which was planned during FY2022 and was held in Israel in August 2022, which we will report more on at the next AGM. Our Leadership Development participants shined in living their dedication to our core values and learned about foreign cultures, making friends they still keep in contact with from other countries. We are also proud to report that this year, we have focussed on improving our staff's conditions, with a new pay structure as well as a professional development plan for all employees. Great emphasis is being placed on diversity, inclusion and equity (DEI) as well as staff mental health. PRIORITY #1

Increase Value of the Hub & Site Health

Phase Two of the DEI strategy was completed. We conducted global capacity building trainings, created a new fellowship strategy and inducted three new global board members, in order to provide greater geographic and demographic representation on our International board. We hired a Director of Impact to lead the monitoring and evaluation team and launched the 20th Anniversary marketing campaign.



02

PRIORITY #2

Expand Global Initiatives

Preparation for the first in-person Friendship Games, and relaunch of the Sport & Peace Collective, which takes care of all our international partners. We inducted Ubumwe, an upcoming partner in Rwanda, and hired a Global Director of Development. We further launched the Leadership Academy, which was conceptualised by an international youth steering committee consisting of young leaders across sites. This program is aimed at our alumni participants after they finish school, to equip them with the skills, resources and networks to become effective agents of change in institutions and their communities, and reach their goals as they enter adulthood.



In the current 2023 financial year, we will expand on and implement the priorities developed this year. We are further developing a multi-year financial plan to assist in raising multi-year funding to sustain the three Global programmes mentioned above.

We would like to thank all of our partners and sponsors for their ongoing support and look forward to continuing these wonderful relationships. We also especially thank all of you, Friends of PeacePlayers and our individual donors, who we could not do without.

I am incredibly proud of what we have accomplished in the past year and excited about what is to come. We thank you for making our journey possible and hope you'll join us for what's next.

Dear Family

This last year has been marked with energy and rejuvenation for PeacePlayers South Africa. We have worked hard to consolidate our programming after the isolating legacy of Covid.

As I reflect on my recent appointment as ED, I am reminded of my own life-long learning and the twists and turns that have tested me. Growing up can be a tough journey, anywhere for anyone. There are many struggles facing young people as they find their identity and purpose, but especially in a country as unequal, diverse, and vulnerable to trauma as South Africa.

The **COURAGE**, **GRACE** and **RESILIENCE** of South Africans are evident daily in our country, but I have never witnessed these more clearly than over the last months amongst the children and youth we work with. The work of PeacePlayers South Africa is not always easy, but it is always rewarding because our young participants have an endless willingness to learn and to make a difference in their communities.

There are many highlights to reflect on. During the first half of 2022, a poignant experience for me was the retreat for our alumni as part of the planning for our local Leadership Academy. While our young leaders have developed the attitudes and motivation to affect systemic change, many have been negatively impacted by inequitable social constructs, making it harder to access resources and achieve their goals. Both our local Leadership Academy Programme and the Global Leadership Academy Programme kicked off in October 2022, affording additional opportunities for networking and growth for participants from all PPI sites.

This year, we have been hard at work improving our monitor and evaluation (M&E) systems to enhance our learning from the work we do, and to better quantify its impact against our logical frameworks and theory of change. We have pilot-ed new M&E software being deployed across PeacePlayers sites, and look forward to building on this for baseline and repeat survey work.



Alongside the many highlights over the last year, there were distinct challenges.

The severe flooding and landslides in KZN in April 2022 were undoubtedly the most tragic of all. Untold numbers lost their lives, and many thousands were displaced.

I am proud to say that despite the extreme distress of those weeks, our PeacePlayers team never wavered in their determination to help one another and support our participants. In partnership with the philanthropic arm of the SFO Group, we were also able to distribute food parcels and vouchers amongst our less fortunate participants and staff members.

PeacePlayers South Africa has many big plans for the future, but in the coming year we aim to diversify our fundraising strategies and increase our donor base in order to be in a better position to expand our programming in 2024 and 2025. Part of this expansion will include reaching more children and youth from affluent as well as Indian and white racial groups. Increased diversification in our programming is an important foundation for greater impact in bridging divides.

My own life's calling is to use my skills, knowledge and gifts to improve the lives of others – even when I feel inadequate to the tremendous amount that needs doing! It is therefore a great privilege to work with the committed and passionate people I have come to know and value on our PeacePlayers local and global team. My gratitude goes out to these people who have dedicated their lives to creating spaces for young people to reach their full potential.

Impact requires strong leadership and sufficient resources. I raise a big thank you to our board for their guidance and support, and to our **donor partners and implementing partners**: without you our work would remain only a dream!

This quote shared with me very recently captures the legacy of enrichment PeacePlayers brings to young South Africans.

MISSION

THEORY OF CHANGE

PeacePlayers South Africa is dedicated to uniting, educating, and inspiring youth from divided communities through the power of sport.

In South Africa, children grow up with the greatest economic inequality in the world. 70% of children are vulnerable not only to poverty but to numerous other stressors – orphanhood, hunger, disability, deep gender inequality, and staggering levels of gender-based violence. The historical backdrop to these is a heritage of apartheid division which continues to yield not only racial conflict, but entrenched disparities in wealth, health and education.

CHALLENGES



Post-Apartheid South Africa is rated by the World Bank as the most unequal country in the world with deep racial, socio-economic and gender divides. The divides are self-reinforcing resulting in intergenerational cycles of inequality and conflict. The majority are vulnerable to multiple stressors, including lack of access to education and livelihood opportunities. 64% of youth and young adults are unemployed, and 50% of children starting school cannot finish.

INPUTS



Engaging children and youth from diverse communities in sustained life skills through basketball programming, led by committed local coaches grounded in leadership development and mentorship.

OUTCOMES



Participants gain the skills, knowledge, attitudes and behaviours that enhance their ability for inside-out transformation, seeing people as people, collaboration, and community leadership. Youth leaders emerge who make positive life choices, challenge stereotypes, and are advocates for peace and social transformation.

IMPACT



Barriers to exclusion are dismantled, and physical, human and social capital rises in a more peaceful, prosperous and equitable society.

LIFE SKILLS THROUGH BASKETBALL AGE 9-18



Primary and High School programme. Twice-weekly lifeskills through basketball sessions with children from diverse communities, and weekly cross-community PeaceLeague Games

LEADERSHIP DEVELOPMENT PROGRAMME (LDP)

AGE 14-18



Specially selected group of 20 high school leaders who have shown their dedication to our core values of equality, and peace leadership, and have been agents of change in their own and other communities. They meet monthly for life skills through basketball activities focused on equipping them with leadership and team-building skills that they can use throughout their lives. The LDP also provides youth opportunities to interact with peers from other Global PeacePlayers sites, and learn from each other's culture and experiences while they are being equipped to become leaders and advocates for peace in their communities.

LEADERSHIP FOR LIFE

Professional Development



Coaches - 18-25 year olds who have graduated from our programming. "Train the trainer" programme - Coaches are supported with a stipend as they further develop their youth mentorship skills and have the opportunity to give back to their communities. They assist in the life skills and LDP programming throughout the year.

Local Leadership Academy



planning has been under way in early 2022 for this new initiative to be launched late in the year, and which builds on our current support of our alumni to equip them with the skills, resources and networks that will enable them to assume positions of influence and to affect global systemic change



Area Coordinators - 18-35 year olds who are part of the PPSA junior staff team and constitute the next level of training for trainers at PPSA. This programme enhances their management and administration skills in an office or organizational setting. The goal of this programme is to equip young people with the skills to manage projects independently, within the context of their local communities, PeacePlayers, and beyond.

Global Leadership Academy



a new global initiative which will be piloted in 2023, and which is aimed at taking local leadership academy work further, supporting PeacePlayers alumni across PeacePlayers sites in reaching their goals, and to position them to affect positive change through their careers, social activism, and as they assume leadership roles.

Professional Development - Area Coordinators (AC) Programme:

The absence of in-person programming during the Covid restrictions in 2021 yielded an opportunity to focus on additional capacity building for our ACs, providing them with training that is hard to facilitate during normal programming periods because of busy schedules. Training focus areas including building programme frameworks, monitoring and evaluation tools, core values at the workplace, core values life skills curriculum training, and other areas of need. They then had to transfer these skills in their own areas by training coaches and helping prepare them to coach participants on the field.

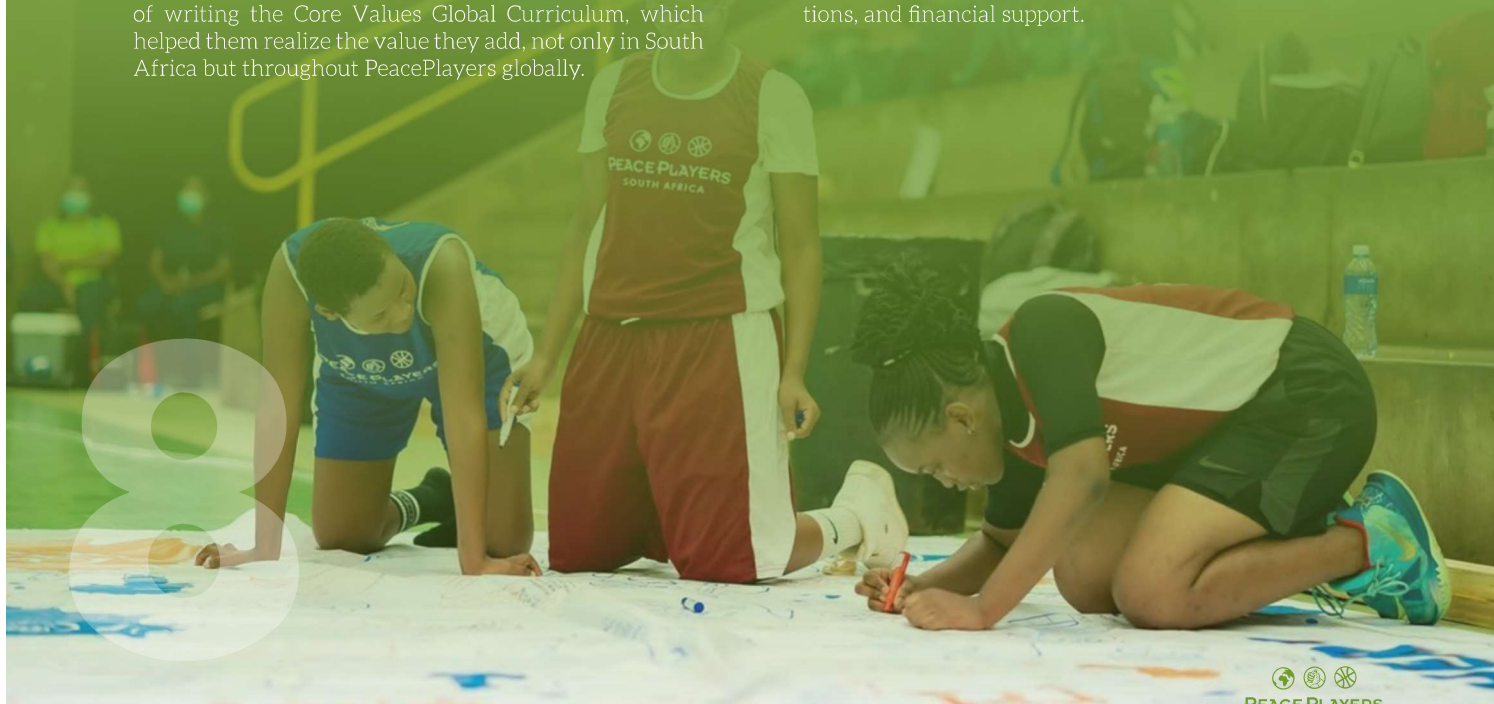
During 2021, our three Area Coordinators represented PPSA in a Virtual Global Friendship Games as facilitators, working together with coaches from the other four PeacePlayers sites (the Middle East, Cyprus, Northern Ireland, and the United States of America). They helped with facilitating conversations and connecting 20 LDP participants from each site with their global peers. We were extremely proud to see our coordinators be a part of writing the Core Values Global Curriculum, which helped them realize the value they add, not only in South Africa but throughout PeacePlayers globally.

Local and Global Leadership Academies:

In June 2022, as part of the Leadership Academy (LA) Kickstart Project, a survey was distributed over a two-week period to our LDP participants, as well as PPSA alumni and staff, with 48 in total being returned. This was followed up by one of the last events of the 2021/22 year -the Leadership Academy Retreat at the end of June.

The objective of the 'Kickstart Project' was to learn about the needs of participants and alumni as they move beyond PPSA programming and into adult life. These learnings are being drawn on to inform local to global LA Programming. The retreat was productive, inclusive, honest, open, and very emotional!

A clear area of need shared is that of access to resources that enable social and economic mobility; within the country and beyond for locals and foreigners. Needs highlighted included career guidance, workplace mentorship, support with tertiary education applications, and financial support.



OUR WORK: CROSS-CUTTING EVENTS

PPSA AND FIGHT WITH INSIGHT GENDER BASED VIOLENCE SESSIONS

PeacePlayers South Africa, in collaboration with Fight With Insight, facilitated the two-day Defender Project in fighting against Gender Based Violence in October 2021. Twenty-one High School Programmes male and female participants took part. During four hour daily sessions, youth were taught self-defence utilising both boxing and basketball activities.

THE RETURN OF THE PPSA 34TH CITY-WIDE TOURNAMENT

After the two year hiatus of Covid, the 34th City Wide Tournament (CWT) was a huge success, with about 500 of our participants coming from different backgrounds and communities to play together in mixed teams, focusing on gender equity and social cohesion. The CWT has been a premier event in Durban for decades. It was a nostalgic reunion for most kids, staff, volunteers, alumni, and various stakeholders. For those who had never felt the energy of a CWT it was a refreshing and unifying experience.

The Primary School and High School Programmes teams were sorted and paired into mixed-gendered teams of participants from different communities to promote the day's theme. Once the horn sounded off, signifying a central clock, the CWT feeling was restored to its former glory, with participants stretching themselves in competition and expanding their comfort zones by introducing themselves to peers from other communities.

BASKETBALL COURT LAUNCH AT SEKELANI PRIMARY SCHOOL, UMLAZI

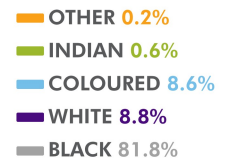
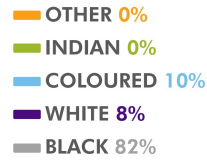
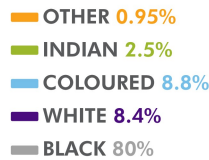
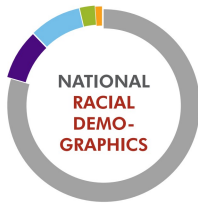

BASKETBALL COURT LAUNCH AT LAMONTVILLE

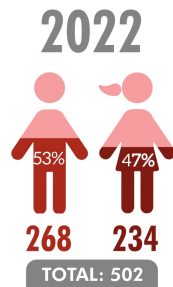
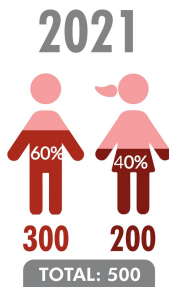

OLWETHU "NANA" VACU

Olwethu "Nana" Vacu plays for and attends VAL University. Last year, her team won the women's division. This is the country's highest achievement for university basketball players.

Her brother, **Simamukele** recently received a scholarship to attend Northwood High School in Durban North, becoming the first 8th grader to receive such recognition at the school. He's now playing basketball for Northwood and his local township community team with PeacePlayers - Umlazi West. In 2021, both Simamukele and his PeacePlayers friend Itumeleng earned Under 14 KwaZulu-Natal Colours for basketball.

Their basketball journey began at PeacePlayers and they are having a ripple effect in encouraging other players and friends in pursuing basketball along with PeacePlayers core values. His sister says she is *"a proud big sister to see him following in my footsteps. We'll continue to strive for greatness and PeacePlayers provided the platform for us to achieve these things."*



BRAYDON RUTHERFORD

Braydon Rutherford credits PeacePlayers for giving him *"the keys of wisdom, resources, and experiences that trumps what any book can teach, allowing those doors of dreams to be opened"*

Braydon's journey with PeacePlayers started with the local Friendship Games in August 2019, and he has quickly become one of PeacePlayers brightest young leaders and a recent graduate of PeacePlayers Leadership Development Programme. He has gone on to launch a leadership programme, "The Corridor", within his own high school that will live on beyond his matric year. Braydon dreams of helping young people *"establish themselves in a leadership pipeline early in their high school career, with hopes of sustaining leadership characteristics and becoming prefects in the future"*. He has left the school as a trailblazer, and is getting set to do a fellowship with PeacePlayers Northern Ireland. He is also part of the first cohort of Global Leadership Academy participants.

"I believe that it is crucial for communities to come together, learn about each other and share their cultures and experiences. This is what brings us together as people and to be able to expose these future revolutionaries to this experience is so rewarding. Spending time with Ukukhanya and teaching each other the heart of our schools is a moment in my life that I will carry forever."



SHELDON FRANCIS

By 2011, **Sheldon Francis** had isolated himself from the circles of crime that were leading him astray, and began to deepen his relationship with PeacePlayers as a coach. He wanted to change his image of himself and understood that young people were increasingly looking to him for guidance. Sheldon says: *"PeacePlayers took me away from gangsterism when I was young. I was headed down a dark path"*

Since refreshing his relationship with the organisation early in 2022, Sheldon has organised food parcels for participants, attended events with PeacePlayers partner LIV Village orphanage, and taken on mentees from our High School Programme through the recently launched Leadership Academy platform.

Sheldon now runs the organisation **Children Have a Dream** (CHAD) which was inspired by his time at PeacePlayers. CHAD's overarching goal is to help youth and drug addicts, who have succumbed to the pressure of their environments, recognize their power and get their lives back on track through productive activities like workshops, rehabilitation, and sporting activities.





LUCY MENSAH

"In Grade 6, a boy told me that girls cannot play basketball. So I decided to play. Over time, Coach Sizwe & Thabiso helped me understand that I can do anything I put my mind to regardless of my gender."

Seven years into her PeacePlayers journey, Lucy has received several scholarships to play basketball at the University level in South Africa. This was the result of her performance at the esteemed VAL Fowler tournament earlier this year at Pietermaritzburg Girls High School. *"At first, I started to doubt myself when I knew I was competing against girls from all over South Africa and even Zimbabwe. I now have a better mindset and approach towards the game. This experience made me feel good about my game and how I see myself as a player."*



OLWAMI ZUNGU

Olwami Zungu first attended the City Wide Tournament in Durban in 2019 with Pietermaritzburg's YMCA. After being immersed in PeacePlayers programmes, Olwami noticed that some participants don't have shoes and play barefoot on hot pavement.

"It's nice to be in an environment [at PeacePlayers events] where what you have, what your parents have or what you achieved doesn't necessarily matter. What matters is what you are trying to bring on the table with somebody that you do not know and what you display about yourself. That is inspiring and gives me a different perspective in life of how I see people, my attitude towards people, and how I think of myself."

I see young girls and boys out here able to play with their bare feet on concrete when it's very, very hot. Instead of them crying about how hot it is and their feet getting damaged, you see smiles on their faces. That alone was heartbreaking to see. I felt like I didn't [fully] appreciate what I have in my own life. Seeing them, as young as they are, playing with the passion and happiness, and not necessarily feeling the need to complain and actually appreciate what they have moved something in me. I thought maybe, with the little that I have, it can make a difference to the kids. So I called family, friends and relatives [to donate shoes]. Anyone who was able to help. Since it was a short period of time, I wasn't able to collect as many as I would have liked. But, hopefully this could be a message to other people. Surely we could 'never have enough' but still it's never ever too little to give, you will never have too little to give to those who are in need. I hope this will inspire other people to also give. Umuntu, ngamunte bantu - everybody needs somebody."
